The Southwest Center for the Developmentally Disabled, inc. (DBA Southwest Center) is a non-profit 501 (C) 3 organization that was founded in 1982 by a group of parents in response to the growing need for programs and employment opportunities for adults with intellectual and developmental disabilities. Since that time, we have grown to provide a wide variety of community-based services, each of which is geared towards helping each person to live, work, and enjoy life in his or her own community.

Our mission is to provide a supportive environment combined with life enriching home and community-based opportunities that assist people with intellectual and developmental disabilities live life to the fullest.

2020 programs -

This year was unprecedented in that the in-person services took a mandated pause related to the COVID-19 pandemic. This resulted in the suspension of all in person services including Day training, Community Access, Community Living Supports, and Personal Assistance. Staff were reassigned to support participants in our residential program to stay health at home.

Community Based Services

- **Residential Services** We provide both Staffed Residences and Family Home Providers **to** allow individuals to live in their own home with the support of trained staff to assist with meals, medications, personal care, and community inclusion.
- Community Living Supports offers individualized guidance and support such as shopping, household care, and other community-based activities
- **Community Access** facilitates independence and promotes integration into the community and development of a network of natural supports for those individual's living in their own home or a family home.
- **Supportive Employment** supports individuals in finding community-based employment options that best suit the skill levels, abilities, and dreams of each individual supported in an integrated community setting.

Facility Based Services

- Day Training-This program allows individuals with intellectual disabilities to gain a
 higher level of independence through learning activities of daily living. Our staff
 work closely to teach skills such as cooking, cleaning, money management, and
 decision making through the activities that we provide both on-site and in the
 community. In addition, we help our participants learn necessary job skills that will
 enable them to obtain employment in the community if they desire to do so.
- Employment Skill Development- Provides options for adults with intellectual and
 developmental disabilities to assist them in earning a paycheck. Options include
 working on-site in our workroom a few hours a day to working off-site at an
 assembly plant, to working with our job coaches to find gainful employment in the
 community.
- Transportation provides a way for individuals with disabilities to get to their medical appointments, the day program, and work sites.

Highlights & Accomplishments

- Provided residential support for 30 people
- Strengthened the Family Home Provider Program
- Created Virtual Day Training Services
- Adjusted programming and staffing to ensure safety and compliance during the COVID-19 pandemic
